1	(2) Appropriate congressional commit-
2	TEES.—The term "appropriate congressional com-
3	mittees" means—
4	(A) the Committee on Armed Services of
5	the Senate;
6	(B) the Committee on Foreign Relations of
7	the Senate;
8	(C) the Select Committee on Intelligence of
9	the Senate;
10	(D) the Committee on Appropriations of
11	the Senate;
12	(E) the Committee on Armed Services of
13	the House of Representatives;
14	(F) the Committee on Foreign Affairs of
15	the House of Representatives;
16	(G) the Permanent Select Committee on
17	Intelligence of the House of Representatives;
18	and
19	(H) the Committee on Appropriations of
20	the House of Representatives.
21	(3) Intelligence community.—The term
22	"intelligence community" has the meaning given
23	that term in section 3(4) of the National Security
24	Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C. 3003(4)).
25	(c) Establishment of Commission.—

1	(1) Establishment.—There is established in
2	the legislative branch an independent commission to
3	be known as the Afghanistan War Commission (in
4	this section referred to as the "Commission").
5	(2) Membership.—
6	(A) Composition.—The Commission shall
7	be composed of 16 members of whom—
8	(i) 1 shall be appointed by the Chair-
9	man of the Committee on Armed Services
10	of the Senate;
11	(ii) 1 shall be appointed by the rank-
12	ing member of the Committee on Armed
13	Services of the Senate;
14	(iii) 1 shall be appointed by the Chair-
15	man of the Committee on Armed Services
16	of the House of Representatives;
17	(iv) 1 shall be appointed by the rank-
18	ing member of the Committee on Armed
19	Services of the House of Representatives;
20	(v) 1 shall be appointed by the Chair-
21	man of the Committee on Foreign Rela-
22	tions of the Senate;
23	(vi) 1 shall be appointed by the rank-
24	ing member of the Committee on Foreign
25	Relations of the Senate;

1	(vii) 1 shall be appointed by the
2	Chairman of the Committee on Foreign
3	Affairs of the House of Representatives;
4	(viii) 1 shall be appointed by the
5	ranking member of the Committee on For-
6	eign Affairs of the House of Representa-
7	tives;
8	(ix) 1 shall be appointed by the Chair-
9	man of the Select Committee on Intel-
10	ligence of the Senate;
11	(x) 1 shall be appointed by the rank-
12	ing member of the Select Committee on In-
13	telligence of the Senate.
14	(xi) 1 shall be appointed by the Chair-
15	man of the Permanent Select Committee
16	on Intelligence of the House of Represent-
17	atives;
18	(xii) 1 shall be appointed by the rank-
19	ing member of the Permanent Select Com-
20	mittee on Intelligence of the House of Rep-
21	resentatives;
22	(xiii) 1 shall be appointed by the ma-
23	jority leader of the Senate;
24	(xiv) 1 shall be appointed by the mi-
25	nority leader of the Senate;

1	(xv) 1 shall be appointed by the
2	Speaker of the House of Representatives;
3	and
4	(xvi) 1 shall be appointed by the Mi-
5	nority Leader of the House of Representa-
6	tives.
7	(B) QUALIFICATIONS.—It is the sense of
8	Congress that each member of the Commission
9	appointed under subparagraph (A) should have
10	significant professional experience in national
11	security, such as a position in—
12	(i) the Department of Defense;
13	(ii) the Department of State;
14	(iii) the intelligence community;
15	(iv) the United States Agency for
16	International Development; or
17	(v) an academic or scholarly institu-
18	tion.
19	(C) Prohibitions.—A member of the
20	Commission appointed under subparagraph (A)
21	may not—
22	(i) be a current member of Congress;
23	(ii) be a former member of Congress
24	who served in Congress after January 3,
25	2001;

1	(iii) be a current or former registrant
2	under the Foreign Agents Registration Act
3	of 1938 (22 U.S.C. 611 et seq.);
4	(iv) have previously investigated Af-
5	ghanistan policy or the war in Afghanistan
6	through employment in the office of a rel-
7	evant inspector general;
8	(v) have been the sole owner or had a
9	majority stake in a company that held any
10	United States or coalition defense contract
11	providing goods or services to activities by
12	the United States Government or coalition
13	in Afghanistan during the applicable pe-
14	riod; or
15	(vi) have served, with direct involve-
16	ment in actions by the United States Gov-
17	ernment in Afghanistan during the time
18	the relevant official served, as—
19	(I) a cabinet secretary or na-
20	tional security adviser to the Presi-
21	dent; or
22	(II) a four-star flag officer,
23	Under Secretary, or more senior offi-
24	cial in the Department of Defense or
25	the Department of State.

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1	(D) Date.—
2	(i) In general.—The appointments
3	of the members of the Commission shall be
4	made not later than 60 days after the date
5	of enactment of this Act.
6	(ii) Failure to make appoint-
7	MENT.—If an appointment under subpara-
8	graph (A) is not made by the appointment
9	date specified in clause (i)—
10	(I) the authority to make such
11	appointment shall expire; and
12	(II) the number of members of
13	the Commission shall be reduced by
14	the number equal to the number of
15	appointments not made.
16	(3) Period of appointment; vacancies.—
17	(A) IN GENERAL.—A member of the Com-
18	mission shall be appointed for the life of the
19	Commission.
20	(B) VACANCIES.—A vacancy in the Com-
21	mission—
22	(i) shall not affect the powers of the
23	Commission; and
24	(ii) shall be filled in the same manner
25	as the original appointment.

1	(4) MEETINGS.—
2	(A) Initial meeting.—Not later than 30
3	days after the date on which all members of the
4	Commission have been appointed, the Commis-
5	sion shall hold the first meeting of the Commis-
6	sion.
7	(B) Frequency.—The Commission shall
8	meet at the call of the Co-Chairpersons.
9	(C) QUORUM.—A majority of the members
10	of the Commission shall constitute a quorum,
11	but a lesser number of members may hold hear-
12	ings.
13	(5) Co-chairpersons.—The Commission shall
14	select, by a simple majority vote—
15	(A) 1 Co-Chairperson from the members of
16	the Commission appointed by chairpersons of
17	the appropriate congressional committees; and
18	(B) 1 Co-Chairperson from the members of
19	the Commission appointed by the ranking mem-
20	bers of the appropriate congressional commit-
21	tees.
22	(d) Purpose of Commission.— The purpose of the
23	Commission is—
24	(1) to examine the key strategic, diplomatic,
25	and operational decisions that pertain to the war in

1	Afghanistan during the relevant period, including
2	decisions, assessments, and events that preceded the
3	war in Afghanistan; and
4	(2) to develop a series of lessons learned and
5	recommendations for the way forward that will in-
6	form future decisions by Congress and policymakers
7	throughout the United States Government.
8	(e) Duties of Commission.—
9	(1) Study.—
10	(A) In General.—The Commission shall
11	conduct a thorough study of all matters relating
12	to combat operations, reconstruction and secu-
13	rity force assistance activities, intelligence oper-
14	ations, and diplomatic activities of the United
15	States pertaining to the Afghanistan during the
16	period beginning September 1, 1996, and end-
17	ing August 30, 2021.
18	(B) Matters studied.—The matters
19	studied by the Commission shall include—
20	(i) for the time period specified under
21	subparagraph (A)—
22	(I) the policy objectives of the
23	United States Government, includ-
24	ing—
25	(aa) military objectives;

1	(bb) diplomatic objectives;
2	(cc) development objectives;
3	and
4	(dd) intelligence objectives;
5	(II) significant decisions made by
6	the United States, including the devel-
7	opment of options presented to policy-
8	makers;
9	(III) the efficacy of efforts by the
10	United States Government in meeting
11	the objectives described in clause (i),
12	including an analysis of —
13	(aa) military efforts;
14	(bb) diplomatic efforts;
15	(cc) development efforts;
16	and
17	(dd) intelligence efforts; and
18	(IV) the efficacy of counterter-
19	rorism efforts against al Qaeda, the
20	Islamic State Khorasan Province, and
21	other foreign terrorist organizations in
22	degrading the will and capabilities of
23	such organizations—
24	(aa) to mount external at-
25	tacks against the United States

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1	mainland or its allies and part-
2	ners; or
3	(bb) to threaten regional
4	stability in Afghanistan and
5	neighboring countries.
6	(ii) the efficacy of metrics, measures
7	of effectiveness, and milestones used to as-
8	sess progress of diplomatic, military, and
9	intelligence efforts;
10	(iii) the efficacy of interagency plan-
11	ning and execution process by the United
12	States Government;
13	(iv) factors that led to the collapse of
14	the Afghan National Defense Security
15	Forces in 2021, including—
16	(I) training;
17	(II) assessment methodologies;
18	(III) building indigenous forces
19	on western models;
20	(IV) reliance on technology and
21	logistics support; and
22	(V) reliance on warfighting
23	enablers provided by the United
24	States;

1	(v) the efficacy of counter-corruption
2	efforts to include linkages to diplomatic
3	lines of effort, linkages to foreign and se-
4	curity assistance, and assessment meth-
5	odologies;
6	(vi) the efficacy of counter-narcotic ef-
7	forts to include alternative livelihoods,
8	eradication, interdiction, and education ef-
9	forts;
10	(vii) the role of countries neighboring
11	Afghanistan in contributing to the insta-
12	bility of Afghanistan;
13	(viii) varying diplomatic approaches
14	between Presidential administrations;
15	(ix) the extent to which the intel-
16	ligence community did or did not fail to
17	provide sufficient warning about the prob-
18	able outcomes of a withdrawal of coalition
19	military support from Afghanistan, includ-
20	ing as it relates to—
21	(I) the capability and sustain-
22	ability of the Afghanistan National
23	Defense Security Forces;

1	(II) the sustainability of the Af-
2	ghan central government, absent coa-
3	lition support;
4	(III) the extent of Taliban con-
5	trol over Afghanistan over time with
6	respect to geographic territory, gov-
7	ernance, and influence; and
8	(IV) the likelihood of the Taliban
9	regaining control of Afghanistan at
10	various levels of United States and co-
11	alition support, including the with-
12	drawal of most or all United States or
13	coalition support;
14	(x) the extent to which intelligence
15	products related to the state of the conflict
16	in Afghanistan and the effectiveness of the
17	Afghanistan National Defense Security
18	Forces complied with intelligence commu-
19	nity-wide analytic tradecraft standards and
20	fully reflected the divergence of analytic
21	views across the intelligence community;
22	(xi) an evaluation of whether any ele-
23	ment of the United States Government in-
24	appropriately restricted access to data
25	from elements of the intelligence commu-

1	nity, Congress, or the Special Inspector
2	General for Afghanistan Reconstruction
3	(SIGAR) or any other oversight body such
4	as other inspectors general or the
5	Gpvernment Accountability Office, includ-
6	ing through the use of overclassification;
7	and
8	(xii) the extent to which public rep-
9	resentations of the situation in Afghani-
10	stan before Congress by United States
11	Government officials were not consistent
12	with the most recent formal assessment of
13	the intelligence community at the time
14	those representations were made.
15	(2) Report required.—
16	(A) In general.—
17	(i) Annual report.—
18	(I) IN GENERAL.—Not later than
19	1 year after the date of the initial
20	meeting of the Commission, and an-
21	nually thereafter, the Commission
22	shall submit to the appropriate con-
23	gressional committees a report de-
24	scribing the progress of the activities
25	of the Commission as of the date of

1	such report, including any findings,
2	recommendations, or lessons learned
3	endorsed by the Commission.
4	(II) Addenda.—Any member of
5	the Commission may submit an ad-
6	dendum to a report required under
7	subclause (I) setting forth the sepa-
8	rate views of such member with re-
9	spect to any matter considered by the
10	Commission.
11	(III) Briefing.—On the date of
12	the submission of the first annual re-
13	port, the Commission shall brief Con-
14	gress.
15	(ii) Final report.—
16	(I) Submission.—Not later than
17	3 years after the date of the initial
18	meeting of the Commission, the Com-
19	mission shall submit to Congress a re-
20	port that contains a detailed state-
21	ment of the findings, recommenda-
22	tions, and lessons learned endorsed by
23	the Commission.
24	(II) Addenda.—Any member of
25	the Commission may submit an ad-

1	dendum to the report required under
2	subclause (I) setting forth the sepa-
3	rate views of such member with re-
4	spect to any matter considered by the
5	Commission.
6	(III) Extension.—The Commis-
7	sion may submit the report required
8	under subclause (I) at a date that is
9	not more than 1 year later than the
10	date specified in such clause if agreed
11	to by the chairperson and ranking
12	member of each of the appropriate
13	congressional committees.
14	(B) FORM.—The report required by para-
15	graph (1)(B) shall be submitted and publicly
16	released on a Government website in unclassi-
17	fied form but may contain a classified annex.
18	(C) Subsequent reports on declas-
19	SIFICATION.—
20	(i) In General.—Not later than 4
21	years after the date that the report re-
22	quired by subparagraph (A)(ii) is sub-
23	mitted, each relevant agency of jurisdiction
24	shall submit to the committee of jurisdic-

1	tion a report on the efforts of such agency
2	to declassify such annex.
3	(ii) Contents.—Each report required
4	by clause (i) shall include—
5	(I) a list of the items in the clas-
6	sified annex that the agency is work-
7	ing to declassify at the time of the re-
8	port and an estimate of the timeline
9	for declassification of such items;
10	(II) a broad description of items
11	in the annex that the agency is declin-
12	ing to declassify at the time of the re-
13	port; and
14	(III) any justification for with-
15	holding declassification of certain
16	items in the annex and an estimate of
17	the timeline for declassification of
18	such items.
19	(f) Powers of Commission.—
20	(1) Hearings.—The Commission may hold
21	such hearings, take such testimony, and receive such
22	evidence as the Commission considers necessary to
23	carry out its purpose and functions under this sec-
24	tion.
25	(2) Assistance from federal agencies.—

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1	(A) Information.—
2	(i) In General.—The Commission
3	may secure directly from a Federal depart-
4	ment or agency such information as the
5	Commission considers necessary to carry
6	out this section.
7	(ii) Furnishing information.—
8	Upon receipt of a written request by the
9	Co-Chairpersons of the Commission, the
10	head of the department or agency shall ex-
11	peditiously furnish the information to the
12	Commission.
13	(B) Space for commission.—Not later
14	than 30 days after the date of the enactment of

(B) SPACE FOR COMMISSION.—Not later than 30 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Administrator of General Services, in consultation with the Commission, shall identify and make available suitable excess space within the Federal space inventory to house the operations of the Commission. If the Administrator of General Services is not able to make such suitable excess space available within such 30-day period, the Commission may lease space to the extent that funds are available for such purpose.

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(3) Postal services.—The Commission may use the United States mails in the same manner and under the same conditions as other departments and agencies of the Federal Government.

(4) GIFTS.—The Commission may accept, use, and dispose of gifts or donations of services, goods, and property from non-Federal entities for the purposes of aiding and facilitating the work of the Commission. The authority in this subsection does not extend to gifts of money. Gifts accepted under this authority shall be documented, and conflicts of interest or the appearance of conflicts of interest shall be avoided. Subject to the authority in this section, commissioners shall otherwise comply with rules set forth by the Select Committee on Ethics of the Senate and the Committee on Ethics of the House of Representatives governing employees of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

(5) Legislative advisory committee.—The Commission shall operate as a legislative advisory committee and shall not be subject to the provisions of the Federal Advisory Committee Act (Public Law 92–463; 5 U.S.C. App) or section 552b, United States Code (commonly known as the Government in the Sunshine Act).

(g) Commission Personnel Matters.—

(1) Compensation of members.—A member of the Commission who is not an officer or employee of the Federal Government shall be compensated at a rate equal to the daily equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay prescribed for level IV of the Executive Schedule under section 5315 of title 5, United States Code, for each day (including travel time) during which the member is engaged in the performance of the duties of the Commission.

(2) Travel expenses.—A member of the Commission shall be allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence, at rates authorized for employees of agencies under subchapter I of chapter 57 of title 5, United States Code, while away from their homes or regular places of business in the performance of services for the Commission.

(3) Staff.—

(A) STATUS AS FEDERAL EMPLOYEES.—
Notwithstanding the requirements of section
2105 of title 5, United States Code, including
the required supervision under subsection (a)(3)
of such section, the members of the commission
shall be deemed to be Federal employees.

1	(B) Executive director.—The Commis-
2	sion shall appoint and fix the rate of basic pay
3	for an Executive Director in accordance with
4	section 3161(d) of title 5, United States Code.
5	(C) PAY.—The Executive Director, with
6	the approval of the Commission, may appoint
7	and fix the rate of basic pay for additional per-
8	sonnel as staff of the Commission in accordance
9	with section 3161(d) of title 5, United States
10	Code.
11	(4) Detail of government employees.—A
12	Federal Government employee may be detailed to
13	the Commission without reimbursement, and such
14	detail shall be without interruption or loss of civil
15	service status or privilege.
16	(5) Procurement of Temporary and inter-
17	MITTENT SERVICES.—The Co-Chairpersons of the
18	Commission may procure temporary and intermit-
19	tent services under section 3109(b) of title 5, United
20	States Code, at rates for individuals that do not ex-
21	ceed the daily equivalent of the annual rate of basic
22	pay prescribed for level V of the Executive Schedule
23	under section 5316 of that title.
24	(h) TERMINATION OF COMMISSION.—The Commis-
25	sion shall terminate 90 days after the date on which the

Commission submits the report required under subsection 1 2 (e)(2)(A)(ii).3 (i) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.— 4 (1) Increase.—The amount authorized to be 5 appropriated by section 4301 for Operation and 6 Maintenance, Defense-wide, for the Office of the 7 Secretary of Defense, is hereby increased by \$3,000,000. 8 9 (2) Offset.—The amount authorized to be ap-10 propriated by section 4301 for Operation and Main-11 tenance, Afghanistan Security Forces Fund, for Af-12 ghanistan Air Force, Line 090, is hereby reduced by

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\$3,000,000.
